1. Introduction

Kenya Wildlife Conservancies Association (KWCA) is announcing a call for proposals through the Kenya Conservancies Fund (KCF) - a dedicated Fund designed to deliver catalytic funding directly to conservancies. The Fund offers simplified, accessible grants that enable conservancies to advance biodiversity conservation, strengthen governance systems, and build climate resilience within their landscapes.

To implement this initiative, KWCA is partnering with the Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH under the International Climate Initiative (IKI) Small Grants – Funding Institutions programme, a strategic financing mechanism of the German Federal Government. Through this collaboration, IKI provides both financial and technical support to help KWCA operationalize the KCF, ensuring that catalytic funding reaches community conservancies and enables them to deliver measurable impacts in biodiversity conservation, good governance, and climate resilience.

Purpose of the Kenya Conservancies Fund (KCF)

KCF is a dedicated financing mechanism hosted and managed by KWCA. Its purpose is to:

Provide small grants to conservancies to enhance biodiversity conservation, improve areas under effective management, and strengthen climate-change adaptation efforts.

Support governance improvements, financial sustainability, and inclusive leadership across Kenya's conservancy network.

Serve as a locally led, transparent, and accessible fund, ensuring that conservancies especially those often overlooked by traditional donors can secure resources to conserve wildlife and support sustainable community livelihoods.

Call Objectives

The KCF - Small Grants Call seeks to strengthen community-led conservation and climate resilience across Kenya's emerging and nascent conservancies. Hosted and managed by the KWCA with support from the IKI Small Grants – Funding Institutions programme and implemented through GIZ, the call invites proposals that will expand conserved landscapes, empower local governance, and create sustainable nature-based livelihoods.

This funding opportunity will establish an accessible Fund that will support 12 new and emerging conservancies for a funding period not more than 18 months.

The main objectives of this call are to:



Enhance Biodiversity Conservation

Support community-led interventions that improves land under conservancy management, strengthen wildlife conservation, and promote ecosystem restoration.



Strengthen Governance and Management

Build institutional capacity, leadership, and transparency within conservancies to achieve inclusive and equitable governance.



Promote Climate-Resilient Livelihoods

Develop and diversify nature-based enterprises that help communities adapt to and mitigate climate change impacts.



2. Eligibility and Selection Criteria

2.1 Eligibility of Applicants

Who may apply: Registered community conservancies in Kenya that demonstrate legal recognition for example but not limited to Registrar of Societies or Community Land Act registration.

Requirements:

- Valid governance structure and functional board/management committee.
- Proven ability to implement small-scale conservation and livelihood projects.
- Capacity to co-finance or provide in-kind contributions is an added advantage.

Ineligible Applicants

- Government agencies.
- For-profit entities.
- Individuals or unregistered groups.

2.2 Eligible Activities

Eligible Activities

The project will finance capacity building, small-grant implementation, and learning activities that strengthen governance, conservation, and financial sustainability of emerging conservancies.

Key interventions include:

- Capacity & Governance Training and mentorship in leadership, financial management, and policy development; preparation of constitutions, by-laws, and management plans.
- Biodiversity Conservation Rangeland restoration, ecological monitoring, wildlife and habitat protection, and community awareness initiatives, supported by basic non-permanent infrastructure (e.g., signage, shade structures).

- Sustainable Livelihoods Development of nature-based enterprises such as beekeeping, eco-tourism micro-ventures, and value-chain activities (e.g., honey or craft products), including limited start-up equipment and market-linkage support.
- Knowledge & Learning Monitoring visits, data collection, and dissemination of lessons through reports and workshops; review and strengthening of KWCA's small-grant mechanism.

Please be informed that the eligible costs must be in line with your submitted budget and must be according to <u>GIZ guidelines</u> All expenditures will comply with GIZ procurement rules, avoid ineligible costs (e.g., permanent construction, medicines, or chemicals without prior approval).

3. Funding Tiers & Conservancy Categories

KCF will provide tiered grant support aligned to a conservancy's growth stage and specific needs. Funding is available for Emerging (New), Nascent, and Early-Mature conservancies, with grant amounts ranging from EUR 47,625 to EUR 70,000 (about KES 6.5 million to KES 9 million).

This stage-based approach ensures that each conservancy receives resources appropriate to its governance capacity, operational maturity, and conservation priorities.

Conservancy Type

Tier 1 - Emerging

Newly established, high-potential conservancies ready to scale

- Legally registered with an active board or interim committee providing strategic direction.
- Foundational governance documents (constitution/by-laws) and at least one Annual General Meeting completed.
- Dedicated financial account and basic bookkeeping that can produce clear financial records.
- Initial management or grazing plan highlighting priority conservation actions and community benefits.
- Demonstrates strong community commitment and clear vision for growth.

Minimum Requirements)

Key Characteristics

EUR 47,625 (≈ KES 6.1 M)

Tier 2 - Nascent

Conservancies with foundational systems and early project experience

- Functioning board
 with regular, minuted
 meetings and emerging
 policy framework
 (finance, procurement,
 conflict-resolution).
- Annual budget and financial statements with basic internal controls; at least one year of successfully managing partner or donor funds.
- Dedicated staff member or structured volunteer management team.
- Active community engagement and benefit-sharing mechanisms.
- Early implementation of habitat management or wildlife monitoring initiatives.

EUR 55,000 (≈ KES 7.2 M)

Tier 3 – Early-Mature

Conservancies with established governance and proven conservation impact

- Experienced board and management team with clear roles and performance oversight.
- Audited financial statements and robust internal controls; demonstrated capacity to co-manage multi-year donor funding.
- Approved management or business plan guiding conservation, tourism, and livelihood activities.
- Proven results

4. KCF Capacity Development Approach

KWCA will deliver a comprehensive support package to strengthen each grantee's governance, financial, and conservation capacity:

- Targeted Training: Structured modules on financial management and compliance, inclusive governance and leadership, monitoring & evaluation, and climate-biodiversity management.
- Mentorship: Pairing grantees with mature conservancies for practical coaching, site visits, and strategic guidance.

- Peer Learning: Regular forums and field exchanges for knowledge sharing, innovation, and partnership building.
- Ongoing Technical Support: Continuous on-site and remote backstopping to help conservancies implement plans and meet grant standards.

This blended approach equips emerging, nascent, and early-mature conservancies with the skills and systems needed to manage grants effectively and achieve lasting conservation impact.



5. Selection Criteria

5.1 Evaluation Process

The review process will be fair, transparent, and free of discrimination:

- An independent Review Committee of technical and financial experts will screen and score concepts and proposals using a standardized rubric.
- A Conflict of Interest Policy requires all reviewers to declare and avoid conflicts.

- Selection criteria include:
 - Financial sustainability and feasibility of the proposed project.
 - o Governance and management capacity of the conservancy.
 - o Conservation impact and alignment with KCF objectives.
 - Community benefits and inclusivity, with attention to gender and youth engagement.

5.2. Due Diligence & Capacity Assessment

To set everyone up for success, shortlisted applicants will take part in a supportive due-diligence and capacity check. This is designed to understand each conservancy's current systems and identify areas where the grant can help strengthen capacity not to exclude anyone. The purpose is to highlight strengths, spot gaps early, and offer tailored capacity-building where needed whether a conservancy is just starting out or already well established.

- Legal Readiness Confirm basic registration, tax status, and any key permits.
- Organizational Capacity Look at governance structure, staffing, and core policies

(finance, procurement, HR) at whatever stage they currently stand.

- Financial & Management Practices –
 Review existing budgeting or record-keeping and any experience handling donor or
 community funds, with flexibility for young
 conservancies still building systems.
 - Risk Awareness & Support Jointly identify potential financial, operational, or environmental/social risks and create a simple risk register that can be updated together during the grant period.
